

Emergency Preparedness Planning

Purpose

If you have not thought about Emergency Preparedness Planning for you and your family, we would encourage you to take a minute to review some information, and consider just how you might survive a disaster or emergency affecting your family. Disasters can come in many forms. They can be Natural Disasters such as floods or tornados, Accidental or Technological Disasters such as a chemical leak or power outage, or hazards caused by Intentional Acts such as Terrorism. Your pre-planned steps will determine just how well you are able to survive a disaster.

Make A Plan

Planning begins with understanding what disasters might impact you. People living along the Gulf Coast will undoubtedly be concerned with issues that are more likely to occur there, like hurricanes. Knowing what disasters could most likely impact your specific community or family is the first step in preparing for a disaster.

Become familiar with the local warning systems and listen to emergency officials preceding and during these events. Heed their advice. They will help advise you on whether to evacuate or shelter-in-place during an emergency. Your family may not all be together when a disaster strikes. By planning in advance, you can establish a communication plan, or a predetermined designated location for people to go to if they are separated during such an event. Communication by phone may be extremely difficult during disasters. In some instances, having a family member or relative some distance away as a designated contact is useful. Hopefully, the disaster did not involve them, and they can serve as a central communication point to share important information, and coordinate activities between family members.

Build A Kit

Your supply kit is a basic collection of items that might be needed during an emergency or disaster. It should be conveniently stored at home and capable of being carried away should you need to evacuate. Have this kit prepared before an emergency strikes. It is recommended that you should plan on constructing a kit to sufficiently meet your basic survival needs for at least 72 hours. It may take several days for emergency workers to reach everyone impacted by a large disaster. In addition, it may take days or even weeks before some utilities can be restored such as water service, electric or gas.

Here are some basic suggested items to help you build an Emergency Preparedness Kit for your family.

- Water- Have one gallon of water per person, per day, for drinking and sanitation.
- Non-perishable foods- Again a 3-day supply per person, per day, is recommended.
- Weather Alert Radio- Battery operated or hand crank radio with NOAA capability.
- Flashlights- Also have extra batteries on hand for all such devices.

- First Aid Kit- Also include other personal hygiene items specific to your needs.
- Filter Masks- To prevent breathing particulates in the air.
- Tools- Simple basic tools to help turn off utilities or assist with repairs or recovery efforts.
- Manual Can Opener- For opening food items stored with your emergency kit.
- Plastic Sheeting and Duct Tape-Useful if you must shelter-in-place.
- Family Documents-Helps to reestablish identity or banking needs if your ID becomes lost.
- Miscellaneous Items- Moist towelettes, garbage bags, and plastic ties for sanitation.
- Other items- Think of specific things you would need. Infant formula, diapers, prescription medication, additional clothing, a whistle, or waterproof matches are some examples.
- Use this information as a guide to personalize your planning efforts and emergency kits.
- Kit Maintenance- Replenish items as needed. Rotate food, water, and medications from the kit. Insure radios, flashlights, and similar items are working properly. Update your plan annually.

Stay Informed and Get Involved

Talk to your employer or your children's school to make sure they have emergency plans in place. Find out how you may be impacted if a business or school implements those plans. If a school goes into a lockdown for example, you may not be able to pick up your children until the emergency has passed. Remember, it is for their safety as well as yours.
